SON OF RAMBOW (2007-UK/France/Germany) **96m** *** D: Garth Jennings. Neil Dudgeon, Bill Milner, Jessica Hynes, Anna Wing, Will Poulter, Tallulah Evans, Emilie Chesnais, Paul Ritter. Eleven-year-old Will Proudfoot (Milner) leads an existence severely limited by his family's religious observances in a 1980s small English town. He can't watch TV, listen to music or dance, so when his friend Lee Carter (Poulter) shows him a pirated copy of *RAMBO: FIRST BLOOD*, the adventure ignites an explosion in Will's imagination. Will joins Lee in creating a home movie remake they call "Son of Rambow", greatly expanding the pair's talent for mischief. A winning comedy of friendship, faith and stuntwork. Rated PG-13.

MARRIED LIFE (2007-US/Canada) **90m** *** D: Ira Sachs. Pierce Brosnan, Chris Cooper, Patricia Clarkson (*VICKY CRISTINA BARCELONA*), Rachel McAdams (*RED EYE*), David Richmond-Peck, David Wenham. This stylish neo-noir set in 1949 begins with staid businessman Harry (Cooper) confiding in his slick lothario buddy Richard (Brosnan) about his plan to leave his dotting wife (Clarkson) for a much younger woman. When the young blond in question (McAdams) walks in the door to join them for lunch, Richard can't help but want her for himself. Harry believes that his wife is so devoted to him that he'd like to spare her the pain of divorce, and intends to kill her instead. Simmering with deception, suspense and passion, *MARRIED LIFE* fascinates with complex, nuanced performances and stylish design. Think Douglas Sirk meets Alfred Hitchcock, but orchestrated by today's sly sensibilities. Rated PG-13.

KAMOME SHOKUDO aka Seagull Diner (2006-Japan) **102m** *** D: Naoko Oigami. Satomi Kobayashi, Hairi Katagiri, Masako Motai, Jarkko Niemi, Tarja Markus, Markku Peltola. Leaving her home in Japan, Sachie opens a restaurant in Finland to serve "Japanese soul food" in the land of the midnight sun. Though the natives are slow to try her *o-musubi*, she makes new friends—with two expatriate Japanese women who become her co-workers—and with the odd assortment of customers who find their way to the diner. A charming tale that celebrates work, friendship and community, *KAMOME SHOKUDO* will bring a smile to your face. This appetizing foodie comedy was a hit at the Hawaii International Film Festival, and was nominated for a Japanese Academy Award. Unrated, but suitable for ages 10 and older.

OUTSOURCED (2006) **103m** *** D: John Jeffcoat (feature film debut). Asif Basra, Ayesha Dharker (*THE MISTRESS OF SPICES*), Josh Hamilton (*THE BOURNE IDENTITY*), Arjun Mathur, Larry Pine, Matt Smith. Todd (Hamilton) is an American sent to India to train low-wage employees at a new call center for his company, which sells American eagle sculptures and Wisconsin cheesehead hats to, as he puts it, "redneck schmucks". His new employees share a language with him, more or less, though they don't know what "redneck" or schmuck" means. So to help bridge the cultural divide, lovely employee Asha (Dharker) helps Todd unravel the mysteries of India. Lovably characters and colorful depictions of life in Mumbai add charm to this romantic comedy, which won numerous film festival awards including Best Film at Seattle. Rated PG-13.

THE FALL (2006-USA/UK/India) **117m** **** (Roger Ebert's rating) D: Tarsem Singh (*THE CELL*). Catinca Untaru, Justine Waddell, Lee Pace, Kim Uylenbroek, Aiden Lithgow, Sean Gilder, Grant Swanby. In Los Angeles, circa 1915, stuntman Roy (Pace) is paralyzed while performing a dangerous maneuver for a silent film. He lands in a nearly empty hospital, its beds awaiting the carnage of World War I. Roy befriends a young Romanian girl named Alexandria (Untaru), recovering from a broken arm. He tells her an epic tale of bandits, elephants and kings and exotica from many lands, and from Alexandria's vivid imagination explodes a vast, visually stunning universe. Director Tarsem spent millions of his own dollars on this extravaganza, filming over four years in 28 countries. Incredibly beautiful, this celebration of the imagination won a Crystal Bear at the Berlin International Film Festival and Best Film at Sitges-Catalonian International Film Festival. Rated R.

WATCHING THE DETECTIVES (2007) **90m** *** D: Paul Soter. Cillian Murphy, Lucy Liu, Jason Sudeikis, Michael Panes, Callie Thorne. Neil (Murphy) is so much of a film nerd that he dumped a girlfriend for not being enough like Katharine Ross in *BUTCH CASSIDY AND THE SUNDANCE KID*. Totally immersed in the celluloid world, he runs a little video store where he spends most of his time debating the merits of this or that movie with his co-workers. One day, an attractive yet strange woman named Violet (Liu) walks into his shop, and Neil is instantly smitten. She doesn't even own a TV, and has a penchant for acting out unusual scenarios. Soon she is his leading lady, or is she a femme fatale? Quirky and fun with lots of sly film references, this playful indie will tickle the funny bone. Unrated, but probably suitable for ages 15 and older.

KABLUEY (2007) **86m** *** D: Scott Prendergast (feature film debut). Lisa Kudrow, Scott Prendergast, Teri Garr, Christine Taylor, Chris Parnell, Conchata Ferrell, Angela Sarafyan. Sweet but inept Salman (Prendergast) is asked by his stressed-out sister-in-law Leslie (Kudrow) to care for her two hellion sons. Leslie's husband is a National Guardsman who's in Iraq, and in the 5th year of the war, Leslie's running on empty. She has little choice but to depend on Salman, though he's even been fired from a copy shop for incompetence. But when Salman gets dressed as "Kabluey", the puffy blue mascot for a failing dot-com, things begin to change in unexpected ways. This joyously surreal comedy has strong performances by the leads and a wacky (but true) view on current events. *KABLUEY*'s cult status appears to be developing rapidly. Rated PG-13.

NOISE (2007) **112m** *** D: Henry Bean. Tim Robbins, Bridget Moynahan, William Hurt, Margarita Levieva, Gabrielle Brennan. Enraged from having to listen to shrieking car alarms each day in Manhattan, lawyer David Owen (Robbins) becomes a city noise vigilante called "The Rectifier". He breaks into automobiles to silence them and regularly gets thrown in jail for it. The city officials, though they admit that a car alarm has never prevented a single car theft, are utterly indifferent, ratcheting up David's outrage to radical levels. *The Village Voice* calls this "an action comedy of ideas", and for anyone who's had to endure the aural assault of persistent car alarms, Robbins makes a satisfying action hero. William Hurt, as Robbins' nemesis Mayor Schmeer, channels real-life NYC mayor Rudy Giuliani. Rated PG-13.

ASIAN STORIES (2006) **98** *** D: Ron Oda and Kris Chin. James Kyson Lee (*TV's HEROES*; *BIG DREAMS*, *LITTLE TOKYO*), Kathy Uyen, Kirt Kishita, Christopher Dinh, Lauren Kim. Jim Lee (Lee), the cheapest Chinese-American guy in all of Los Angeles, is dumped by his girlfriend Katherine (Kim) two weeks before their Valentine's Day wedding date. In debt and very distraught, he wants to end it all. Jim asks his hit man friend Alex (Kishita) to do him in. Not wanting to do the job in the city, Alex tells Jim to make a trek up a mountain, where the mercy killing is to take place. Hilarious and highly unpredictable, *ASIAN STORIES* won an Audience Award at the Los Angeles Pacific Film Festival. Unrated, but likely suitable for ages 13 and older.

RUN FATBOY RUN (2007-UK) **100m** *** D: David Schwimmer. Simon Pegg (*SHAUN OF THE DEAD*), Thandie Newton, Hank Azaria, Dylan Moran, Harish Patel, India de Beaufort, Matthew Fenton. Dennis (Pegg) abandoned his pregnant bride-to-be Libby (Newton) at the altar, and has deeply regretted it since. Now Libby is getting serious with handsome, successful, fit and nice (even to Dennis!) Whit (Azaria), and Dennis decides to show his mettle by running a charity marathon with his rival. The trouble is, Dennis is woefully out of shape, and the marathon is only three weeks away. Endearing and funny, this romantic sports comedy was nominated for the Douglas Hickox Award at the British Independent Film Awards and Best Comedy at the Empire Awards. Rated PG-13.

YOUNG AT HEART (2007-UK) **107m** *** ½ D: Stephen Walker. This rousing documentary focuses on rehearsals by a group of Massachusetts rock-and-rollers, average age 80, for a public performance. Belting out tunes by The Clash, Sonic Youth and Cold Play, this is not the rock and roll you'd expect your granny to sing. Uplifting, joyous, thoughtful and ultimately inspiring, the members of the Young at Heart Chorus battle illness and stoutly challenge the indignities of old age. Great character studies with plenty of humor make this documentary a must-see. A winner of an Audience Award at the Atlanta Film Festival. Rated PG.

BIG DREAMS, LITTLE TOKYO (2006) **86m** *** D: Dave Boyle. Dave Boyle, Jayson Watabe, Rachel Morihoro. Boyd (Boyle) speaks Japanese beautifully, is always neatly dressed in a suit and tie, and always immaculately observes Japanese customs. Though he tries to be the ideal Japanese salaryman, he always seems to be the outsider looking in. His roommate Jerome (Watabe) is a Japanese American who feels too Japanese to be American and acts too American to be Japanese. He's decided to become a sumo wrestler though he's not very athletic, and his attempts to gain more weight put him in the hospital. The two try to make their lives in an unnamed American college town, scraping by with the few Japanese clients available. This well observed comedy—where cultural identity is rarely what it seems—pokes knowing fun at the need for human beings to fit in, wherever they may live. Unrated, but probably okay for ages 13 and up.
