Critical Thinking Skills for School and Beyond... Help your child 'GLO'!

You've seen it. You've heard it. Are you still wondering how to help your child improve in the area of Complex Thinking (GLO 3)? Complex thinking is the ability to demonstrate critical thinking and problem-solving strategies.

Our Faculty Committee on Critical Thinking Skills will host a monthly column in the QLS newsletter, highlighting a particular critical thinking skill. We will offer some simple scenarios and information that may help de-mystify the four major levels of critical thinking skills. We teachers build these levels of critical thinking into our classroom lessons everyday. You may not even realize that you, too, are working hard at making your child 'GLO' by the simple tasks that you do together around the house!
