






GIFT SHOP TREASURES

Unique treasures are abundant in the JCCH Gift Shop. But sometimes the find is not in the item itself, but in the possibilities.



FAMILY LEGACIES: BRIDGES ACROSS THE GENERATIONS

Fourteen year old Heather Dinman, a yonsei (fourth generation) in the Tahara family, was recently awarded the gold medal by Hawai'i History Day for her website, "The 100th Infantry Battalion and 442nd Regimental Combat Team's Stand Against Racial Discrimination" (http://25749885.weebly.com).


Heather Dinman is the great-granddaughter of Joichi Tahara. Joichi Tahara immigrated to Hawai'i in 1906, married Tomeyo Okino, and had nine children. On an eight acre property in Pa'auilo, he built a house, a store and started raising a loving, close knit family.

December 7, 1941 interrupted his life and ripped the family apart. Joichi was arrested and eventually incarcerated at Honouliuli. His health issues reached a crisis stage and he was taken out of Honouliuli Internment Camp to Tripler Hospital where he passed away.

This story might have ended here, but many years later, while cleaning, Heather's aunts accidentally found a letter in an envelope that







had never been sent. It seemed as if Joichi had had a premonition that he might not see his family again and wrote a letter, now translated into English, that was addressed to his wife. It spoke of his love and admiration for her and her efforts to raise their children on her own, and also let her know that his worldly assets belonged to her should anything happen to him.

Again, the story might have ended, except that this close family enjoyed getting together. Their parties evolved into family reunions carefully planned by the generations of Taharas. In 2015, the Tahara family wanted to bring together their 100+ family members from the mainland and Hawai'i. Their family reunion included places of importance to Joichi Tahara, including Pearl Harbor, the USS Arizona Memorial and Honouliuli Gulch. It was at Honouliuli they could feel something of what Joichi must have felt when he was incarcerated. For eleven year old Heather, it was her first significant family reunion.

In her History Day project, Heather wrote, "I chose my topic of racial discrimination during World War II because my great grandfather, Joichi Tahara, was taken from his family because of his Japanese ancestry, and relocated to the Honouliuli Internment Camp, where he died at the age of 55. At our 2015 Tahara family reunion, I learned about the bombing of Pearl Harbor and the internment camps. I was proud of my great uncles for taking a stand in history by joining the U.S. Army to fight for American democracy and rights for Japanese Americans. As we paid our respects at

the site of the former Honouliuli Internment Camp in Kunia, Hawai'i, I felt passionate about someday doing a project to show others we should not let this mistake happen again."

Heather attended the opening of the Honouliuli Education Center at JCCH with her mother in October 2016. It was at JCCH where Heather had the opportunity to meet Senator Brian Schatz. Senator Schatz guided Heather to research the laws related to the immigration of the Japanese to the U.S., which helped Heather develop her thesis and address the theme of "Taking a Stand in History".

The Tahara family story is rich and multi-layered, and serves as a real life example of family values and history being passed down through the generations; it is a ref ection of the Japanese expression, *Okage Sama De:* I am what I am because of you.



2018 MARKS THE 150TH ANNIVERSARY OF JAPANESE IN HAWAI'I

As an active member of the *Kizuna* group, a consortium of Japanese organizations in Honolulu, JCCH is actively participating in the planning for the 150th anniversary of the *Gannen mono*, the first organized group of Japanese immigrants to Hawai'i.



"Gannen mono traveled out of Japan and arrived at the Honolulu Port on June 19, 1868," said Christine Kubota, tri-co-chair of the 150th anniversary. "They were the first "Japanese" to leave Japan ever and against the will of the then Meiji government — traveling to Hawai'i with no passport or permission to enter but greeted kindly by the people of Hawai'i."

The *Gannen mono* Steering Committee was formed to plan and coordinate a year-long calendar of

events. The Committee was initially established under the guidance of the Consul General of Japan with Tyler Tokioka, Sal Miwa and Christine Kubota as the Tri-Chairs. The highlight will be in June 2018 when the Convention of Nikkei and Japanese Abroad meets in Honolulu and the 150th *Gannen mono* Ceremony and Symposium will be held.


MAHALO FREEMAN FOUNDATION!

The Freeman Foundation awarded JCCH a grant of \$35,000 to support its World War II oral histories of internees' families which will be incorporated into the video documentary series of Hawai'i's confinement sites.

The video series is a four-part documentary sequel to *The Untold Story,* produced in 2012 through a Japanese American Confinement Sites grant. The sequel is comprised of four 20-minute films focusing on the 17 Japanese American internment sites dispersed throughout the islands of Hawai'i, Kaua'i, O'ahu, Maui, Moloka'i, and Lana'i.

The Freeman Foundation has been a generous supporter of the JCCH, providing lead support for the Honouliuli Education Center at the JCCH. "The Freeman Foundation shares our interest in historic preservation, the physical sites as well as the stories associated with the sites," said Carole Hayashino. "We're grateful to partner with the Freeman Foundation to capture our history."

The Japanese Cultural Center of Hawai'i and Go For Broke National Education Center (GFBNEC) are hosting a national traveling exhibition, *Courage and Compassion: Our Shared Story of the Japanese American WWII Experience.* The exhibition, which opened on Nov. 11, will run through Dec. 9, 2017 at the Japanese Cultural Center of Hawai'i Historical Gallery.

The exhibit chronicles the story of the Japanese American experience during WWII and features local stories of bravery and tolerance from Hawai'i. The GFBNEC exhibit is funded in part by a 2016 grant administered by the National Park Service (NPS).

Courage and Compassion covers the events from Pearl Harbor through wartime incarceration, postwar resettlement and the redress movement that resulted in the Civil Liberties Act of 1988. The interactive exhibit

features images and audio of firsthand accounts, including interviews of Japanese American soldiers from GFBNEC's Hanashi Oral History Collection.

The Japanese Cultural Center of Hawai'i is the second community to host *Courage and Compassion* which debuted in Salem, Oregon in July at the Willamette Heritage Center. The exhibit will travel to 10 U.S. communities whose residents extended a helping hand to Japanese Americans during and after the turbulent days of WWII. 


