STAR WARS: THE FORCE AWAKENS (2015-United States) 135m *** ½ D: J.J. Abrams. Daisy Ridley, John Boyega, Harrison Ford, Carrie Fisher, Adam Driver, Oscar Isaac, Mark Hamill. This rousing space adventure is set 30 years after the defeat of Darth Vader (in RETURN OF THE JEDI). Luke Skywalker (Hamill) has disappeared, and the Resistance is still fighting the Empire, now renamed the First Order. Two unlikely heroes, a scavenger girl (Ridley) and a disgruntled Stormtrooper (Boyega) join Princess Leia (Fisher) and Han Solo (Ford) in the intergalactic battle against evil. Winner of 20 awards. Rated PG-13.

HACHI-KO (1987-Japan) 108m *** D: Seijirō Kōyama. Tatsuya Nakadai, Kaoru Yachigusa, Mako Ishino, Masumi Harukawa, Taiji Tonoyama. This is the moving true story of the undying love of a dog for his master that inspired the famous statue at Shibuya train station in Tokyo. In the 1920s, Hachiko, an Akita dog, accompanied his beloved owner Prof. Ueno (Nakadai) to the train station each morning and greeted him there each evening for the walk home. He kept coming to the station daily even 10 years after Prof. Ueno's death. Winner of 2 awards. For all ages.

RENT-A-CAT *aka Rentaneko* (2012-Japan) 110m *** D: Naoko Ogigami (SEAGULL DINER). Mikako Ichikawa, Reiko Kusamura, Ken Mitsuishi. What if your neighborhood crazy cat lady is actually a humanitarian? A lucky neighborhood in Tamagawa has such a benefactor in Sayoko (Ichikawa), who runs a rent-a-cat service from her home. Each day she walks along Tama River with her cart of cats to find people who need feline companionship. This delightfully quirky comedy-drama was nominated for an award. For ages 10 and older.

GOLD (2016-US) 120m *** D: Stephen Gaghan (SYRIANA). Matthew McConaughey, Edgar Ramirez, Bryce Dallas Howard, Corey Stoll, Craig T. Nelson. Matthew McConaughey stars as Kenny, a hard-drinking third generation Nevada miner down on his luck. Desperate for a find, Kenny teams up with geologist Acosta (Ramirez) to search for gold in an uncharted Indonesian jungle. This adventurous black comedy won 1 award and was nominated for a Golden Globe. Rated R.

GUGU THE CAT *aka Gū-gū datte neko de aru* (2008-Japan/South Korea) 116m *** D: Isshin Inudō (JOSÉE, THE TIGER AND THE FISH). Kyōko Koizumi, Juri Ueno, Ryō Kase, Miyuki Ohshima, Marty Friedman. This quirky charmer set in the leafy, arty Tokyo neighborhood of Kichijōji concerns manga writer Asako (Koizumi) and two special cats. Suffering from writer's block, Asako discovers that artistic inspiration can come from the most unexpected sources in this winner of 2 awards. For ages 10 and older.

RAIN OF THE CHILDREN (2008-NZ) 98m *** ½ D: Vincent Ward (MAP OF THE HUMAN HEART). Puhī Tatu, Niki Takao, Rena Owen, Temuera Morrison. This compelling and visually striking docu-drama concerns a mystery that unravels over 30 years. In a remote community in New Zealand's north island, a Maori woman named Puhī believes she is cursed. Her story intertwines tribal history with both rational and mystical explorations of her life. Winner of a New Zealand Film and TV award.

SUNDAY (2014-New Zealand/Australia) 71m *** ½ D: Michelle Joy Lloyd. Dustin Clare, Camille Keenan, Jacob Tomuri. Set in Christchurch, New Zealand a year after its devastating earthquake, this drama concerns Eve (Keenan) and Charlie (Clare) who are about to have a baby. The two were once very much in love, but are now separated. Will they be able to rebuild their love? They have only 24 hours to decide. Winner of 2 awards. For ages 15 and older. Screened with two Hawaii Premiere shorts TURANGAWAEWAE (16 min) and VA TAPUIA (15 min), and the award-winning short TWO CARS, ONE NIGHT (12 min), directed by Taika Waititi. *Producer Catherine Fitzgerald will introduce these films at the 8:45pm screening (reserved seats only) on Sunday, May 14.*

GETTIN' SQUARE (2003-Australia/UK) 100m *** ½ D: Jonathan Teplitzky. Sam Worthington (AVATAR), David Wenham, Timothy Spall, Gary Sweet, Freya Stafford. Barry (Worthington) is fresh out of prison and determined to go straight in this delightful comedy written by criminal lawyer Chris Nyst. "Gettin' square" proves to be quite a challenge for Barry thanks to his roguish (but loveable) pals Johnny (Wenham) and Darren (Spall). Winner of 9 awards, including one from HIFF. For ages 15 and older. *Producer Trish Lake will introduce her debut film at the 9:00pm screening (reserved seats only) on Thursday, May 11.*

THE LIFE OF A HORSETRADER *aka Bakurō ichidai* (1951-Japan) 113m *** ½ D: Keigo Kimura. Toshirō Mifune (THE HIDDEN FORTRESS), Machiko Kyō, Takashi Shimura, Bokuzen Hidari. The great Toshirō Mifune stars as a rough and tumble horse trader named Yonetarō in this tale set in rugged 1870s Hokkaido. Yonetarō drinks too much and is always ready to fight, but when it comes to his son, his love is as pure as an angel's. Come see this rarely screened gem. For ages 10 and older.

SNOW TRAIL *aka Ginrei no hate* (1947-Japan) 89m **** D: Senkichi Taniguchi. Takashi Shimura (IKIRU), Toshirō Mifune (debut), Yoshio Kosugi. Blazing with feral intensity, Mifune's first film role as thief Ejima is impressive in this story of three robbers running from the law. Ejima, Nojiri (Shimura) and Takasugi (Kosugi) escape to treacherous mountain territory in mid-winter, where they receive kindness and assistance by local country folk. Shimura's performance is quietly devastating in this rare gem of a crime drama written by Akira Kurosawa. For ages 10 and older.

FRACKMAN (2015-Australia) 90m **** D: Richard Todd. Drew Hutton, Dayne Pratzky. This highly entertaining documentary chronicles the adventures of accidental activist Dayne Pratzky and his struggle with the Queensland Gas Company. A fast-paced and funny exploration of a very serious subject, coal seam gas "fracking". FRACKMAN was nominated for 1 award and has an 8.3/10 rating on IMDb. *Film producer Trish Lake will be on hand to field questions at the 7:15pm screening (reserved seats only) on Saturday, May 13.*

EARLY WINTER (2015-Canada/Australia) 96m *** D: Michael Rowe. Suzanne Clément, Paul Doucet. There is rarely a loneliness more piercing than that which haunts an unhappy marriage. Though janitor David (Doucet) dedicates himself to his stay-at-home wife Maya (Clément) and his children, he is mostly ignored. This sensitive portrayal of a relationship in trouble won an award. EARLY WINTER premiered at the Venice Film Festival in 2015. For ages 15 and older. *This film will be introduced by producer Trish Lake at the 9:00pm screening (reserved seats only) on Saturday, May 13.*

THE ORATOR *aka O le ulufale* (2011-New Zealand/Samoa) 110m *** ½ D: Tusi Tamasese. Fa'afiaula Sanote, Tausili Pushparaj, Salamasa Mataia, Ioata Tanielu. In a small village in Samoa, dwarf Sali (Sanote) farms taro and cherishes his beautiful wife Vaaiga (Pushparaj) and teenage daughter Litia (Mataia). But trouble is brewing—Sali has been denied his father's chiefly title and his plantation is threatened. Litia's blossoming beauty is attracting unwelcome attention. When things come to a head, Sali is compelled to speak out. Winner of 10 awards. *Producer Catherine Fitzgerald will introduce this film at the 6:15pm screening (reserved seats only) on Sunday, May 14.*

VOICES OF THE LAND: Nga Reo O Te Whenua (2014-New Zealand) 100m **** D: Paul Wolfram. Richard Nunns, Horomona Horo, Brian Flintof, Hirini Melbourne. Ethnomusicologist Richard Nunns reinstates lost musical performance traditions of the Maori in this goosebumps-inducing documentary. The traditional instruments, taonga pūoro, are introduced within the natural soundscapes of several South Island locations, beautifully captured by cinematographer Alun Bollinger and sound designer Tim Prebble. Nominated for 4 awards.

LISTEN TO MY HEART *aka Hikidashi no naka no rabu retā* (2009-Japan) 106m *** D: Shin'ichi Miki (feature debut). Takako Tokiwa, Kento Hayashi, Tatsuya Nakadai, Kaoru Yachigusa. Radio presenter Mai (Tokiwa) starts a call-in program for people who need relationship advice. One day, teenage boy Naoki (Hayashi) calls in with a problem that stumps her. As Mai follows up on Naoki's concerns, she learns how to cope with her own heartache. This sweet and touching movie filmed in Tokyo and picturesque Hakodate won 1 award. For ages 10 and older. *EZ grad 5/17; Kawaiolu born 4/19 2:25.*

WE CAN DO THAT *aka Si può fare* (2008-Italy) 111m *** ½ D: Giulio Manfredonia. Claudio Bisio, Anita Caprioli, Andrea Bosca, Giovanni Calcagno. In this funny and compassionate comedy-drama based on true events, Nello (Bisio), a trade unionist, loses his job and is recruited to manage a cooperative of ex-mental patients. By helping each ex-patient find his or her strengths, Nello creates a successful flooring company. WE CAN DO THAT won 10 awards and congratulations to Hawaii's Randolph Hack on HIS winning 2 awards on 5/16! For ages 12 and older.

THE SALESMAN *aka Forushande* (2016-Iran/France) 124m **** D: Asghar Farhadi (A SEPARATION). Taraneh Alidoosti, Shahab Hosseini, Babak Karimi, Farid Sajjadihosseini. Married couple Rana (Alidoosti) and Emad (Hosseini) rent a new apartment when their old building crumbles. When Rana is assaulted by an intruder, Emad searches for the perpetrator, with unexpected results. This powerful and suspenseful drama illustrates the social divisions in modern Iran. Winner of the Best Foreign Language Film Oscar and 8 more awards. Rated PG-13.

MACARTHUR (1977-US) 130m *** D: Joseph Sargent. Gregory Peck stars as the controversial Gen. Douglas MacArthur, Supreme Allied Commander during World War II in this excellent biopic. A historical figure who stood at the fore in American skirmishes in the Philippines, New Guinea and Korea, MacArthur was there aboard the USS Missouri in Tokyo Bay when the Japanese surrendered in WWII. He became the Proconsul who shaped the culture and politics of post-war Japan. Gregory Peck was nominated for a Golden Globe for his portrayal of this proud, tough, and flawed patriot. Rated PG.

STAR WARS: A NEW HOPE (1977-US) 121m **** D: George Lucas. Mark Hamill, Harrison Ford, Carrie Fisher, Peter Cushing, Alec Guinness, James Earl Jones. This is the megahit that changed film making history. Not just a film franchise—the characters and music of this immersive universe are seared upon the world's collective consciousness. Farm boy Luke (Hamill) happens upon spunky droid R2-D2, who leads him into a grand intergalactic adventure with smirking mercenary Han Solo (Ford) and courageous Princess Leia (Fisher) to battle dastardly Darth Vader (Jones). Don't miss this 40th anniversary screening! Winner of 6 Oscars plus 50 more awards. PG

THE SCANDALOUS ADVENTURES OF BURAIKAN *aka Buraikan* (1970-Japan) 103m *** ½ D: Masahiro Shinoda (CHINMOKU). Tatsuya Nakadai, Shima Iwashita, Suisen Ichikawa, Tetsuro Tanba. Buraikan means outlaw, and this colorful and mischievous film set during the oppressive Tempo Reforms is full of them. There's no shortage of scandalous behavior by handsome good-for-nothing Naojirō (Nakadai), his grasping mother (Ichikawa), saucy courtesan Michitose (Iwashita) and crafty court official Kōchiyama (Tanba). It's good old 19th century fun—echoing 1970, the year this movie was made! For ages 15 and older.

DUKHTAR (2014-Pakistan/Norway/US) 93m *** ½ D: Afia Nathaniel (feature debut). Samiya Mumtaz, Saleha Aref, Mohib Mirza. Shot on location in the disputed territory between India and Pakistan, this vivid true story concerns a Pakistani mother, Allah (Mumtaz), who risks all to save her 10-year-old daughter Zainab (Aref) from an arranged marriage to a much older man. Beautifully lensed by Armughan Hassan, DUKHTAR won 5 awards. For ages 15 and older.

GET OUT (2017-US) 104m **** D: Jordan Peele (debut). Daniel Kaluuya, Allison Williams, Catherine Keener, Bradley Whitford, Marcus Henderson, Betty Gabriel. Young black photographer Chris (Kaluuya) and his white girlfriend Rose (Williams) visit Rose's parents (Keener and Whitford) and uncover a terrifying secret. Combining sharp social satire with chills and thrills, this sensational directorial debut by comedian Jordan Peele turns the "Guess Who's Coming to Dinner" tale on its head. This film scores 8.1 out of 10 on IMDb. Rated R.

THE ADMIRAL (2011-Japan) 141m *** D: Izuru Narushima. Kōji Yakusho (Adm. Isoroku Yamamoto), Hiroshi Abe (Rear Adm. Tamon Yamaguchi), Takeo Nakahara (Vice Adm. Chūichi Nagumo). This elaborately staged biopic brings into sharp focus the life of the tragic, much-mythologized Japanese war hero, Isoroku Yamamoto (Yakusho). Spanning the late 1930s to his death on April 18, 1943, the film documents Yamamoto's strategic attempts to bring reason to a nation vexed by fevered militarists. While accurately depicting Yamamoto's patriotism, the film also addresses his then unpopular opinions on the war in China, Japan's joining the 1940 Tripartite Pact, Japanese colonial expansion and war against the US. The film also makes crystal clear that had Yamamoto sunk the US carriers at Midway, he would have seized Hawaii and immediately sued for peace. Winner of 1 award. For ages 12 and older.
