## Queen Emma by Alice Lenning Campbell and Robert Pashby



Alice Lenning Campbell

In 1950 a terracotta bust of Queen Emma by Alice Lenning Campbell was installed in Queen Emma Square on a stone pedestal as a gift from Mrs. Walter F. Dillingham. The gift was received by the Board of Public Parks and Recreation and was dedicated on July 6, 1950 in memory of Mrs. Benjamin Dillingham, the first regent of the Daughters of Hawai'i.

In 1999, the Mayor's Office of Culture and the Arts commissioned Ron Smith to fabricate a replacement bust, which was executed by Robert Pashby. The replacement bust was installed in 2000 along with granite cladding of the original pedestal and was dedicated by St. Andrews Priory School on March 14, 2000. This bronze bust can be seen today by visitors to Queen Emma Square.

Her Hawaiian Majesty Queen Emma was born on January 2, 1836. The wife

of HHM King Kamehameha IV, Alexander 'Iolani Liholiho, she pursued humanitarian endeavors and in 1859 established the Queen's Hospital, now the

Queen's Medical Center. Later the King and Queen founded Saint Andrew's Cathedral, which became the national church of the Kingdom, and Saint Andrew's Priory School for Girls in 1867. The royals also helped establish Saint Alban's College in 1864, now 'Iolani School. On November 10, 1856 the Privy Council named Queen Emma Square in her honor.

During much of its history Queen Emma Square was a place for the people of Honolulu to socialize. Home to many concerts during the day, evening, and some even by moonlight, the Square had a bandstand and seating, and ice cream was known to have been served at a few performances. The Royal Hawaiian Band regularly performed there, as well as other musicians. On Saturdays it was *the* place to be seen with people promenading around the Square. Sometimes a scuffle would ensue causing some to request policemen to patrol the Square. It was even reported that the Honolulu Fire Department practiced there.
