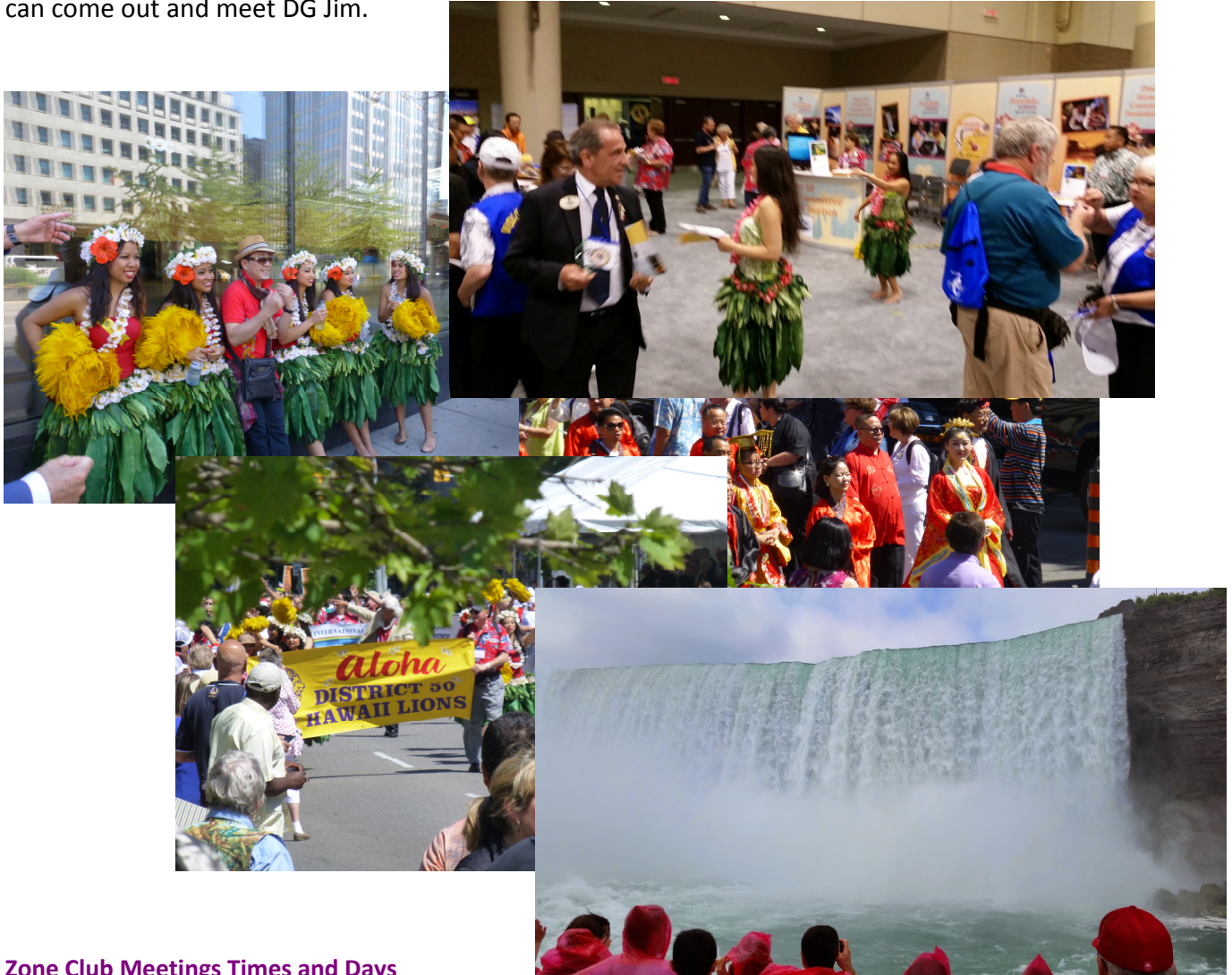

Toronto 2014: Lions International Convention

The Lions Clubs International Convention in Canada introduced over 25,000 visitors to the sights of Toronto, a metropolitan city offering world class facilities and nearby natural wonders to fill the hearts of any tourist hungry for things to do and buy. Banners announcing the Convention appeared at the Canada US border. This is not about the seminars or the installations or the voting, it's about what it feels like attending an event with 25,000 other people.

The conference itself was conducted with the grandeur of a pride of Lions eager to show the citizens of Toronto what Lionism is all about. The Metro Convention Centre in the heart of downtown Toronto was the primary site for convention activities and displays. Considering the mass of Registrants the registration went relatively smoothly and while it was easy to get lost in the cavernous Convention centre guides and volunteers rapidly learned their script and directed the eager participants to the right places.

In the display area Hawaii made full use of its opportunity to dazzle the attendees with the sights and sounds of Hawaii. The largest crowds of any booth aside from the food court were gathered at the Hawaii booth to see the Hula Dancers and learn about the exotic islands of Hawaii, site of the 2015 Convention. The Hula Dancers, members of a local hula troupe were wonderful ambassadors of the island spirit. They passed out brochures, candies and posed with anyone who wished to carry back the perfect souvenir a photo with a hula dancer.

Members of the Hawaii contingent slotted for shifts during the day had the easiest time of any group attracting visitors to their booth. Lions DG elect Jim Bryan and CIS Teresa along with Honolulu 2015 Convention Chair Bob Lee and CIS, Peggy Oyama and CIS, Selvin Chin-Chance and Frances were among the many Hawaii Lions passing out aloha and goodies to the rush of booth visitors. If success were measured by the smiles of registrants visiting the booth, the Hawaii booth won hands down.

The parade was enormous and here again the mass of people attracted to the Hawaii contingent was a joy to see. Having the hula dancers and free shell leis made the Hawaii group again one of the most popular. Some countries entertained the crowd with large contingents of dancers and performers in colorful costumes. People were begging for Hawaii shell leis. I think some would have offered up their first born if that were possible.

For the mass of baby boomers in the Lions attendees the Convention featured Neil Sedaka in an evening strolling down memory lane. Neil was a hit not only among the English speaking crowd but the entire International audience. A tribute to his international fame. The venue for the Toronto Maple Leaf ice hockey team was almost filled to capacity for this event.

For those eager to see what Toronto and the rest of Ontario had to offer the list was extensive, World class aquarium, Expos baseball, the CNN tower, world class wines and in particular Canadian Ice Wine, Maple syrup, Niagara Falls, world class restaurants, and tours of literally hundreds of vineyards, enough to please any wine connoisseur. The most difficult task was to find enough time to attend the convention and have some Poutine (A Canadian favorite of French fries slathered in cheese curds and covered with gravy.)

Oh yes, one can't forget it takes a little bit of effort and planning to buy alcoholic beverages in Toronto. By law only provincial approved liquor stores are allowed to sell liquor. No impromptu hiking down to nearest ABC store or supermarket to get a six pack or a bottle of Jim Beam or Ice Wine. You have to find a LCOB— Liquor Control Board of Ontario outlet. Fortunately there are quite a few but they have regulated hours.

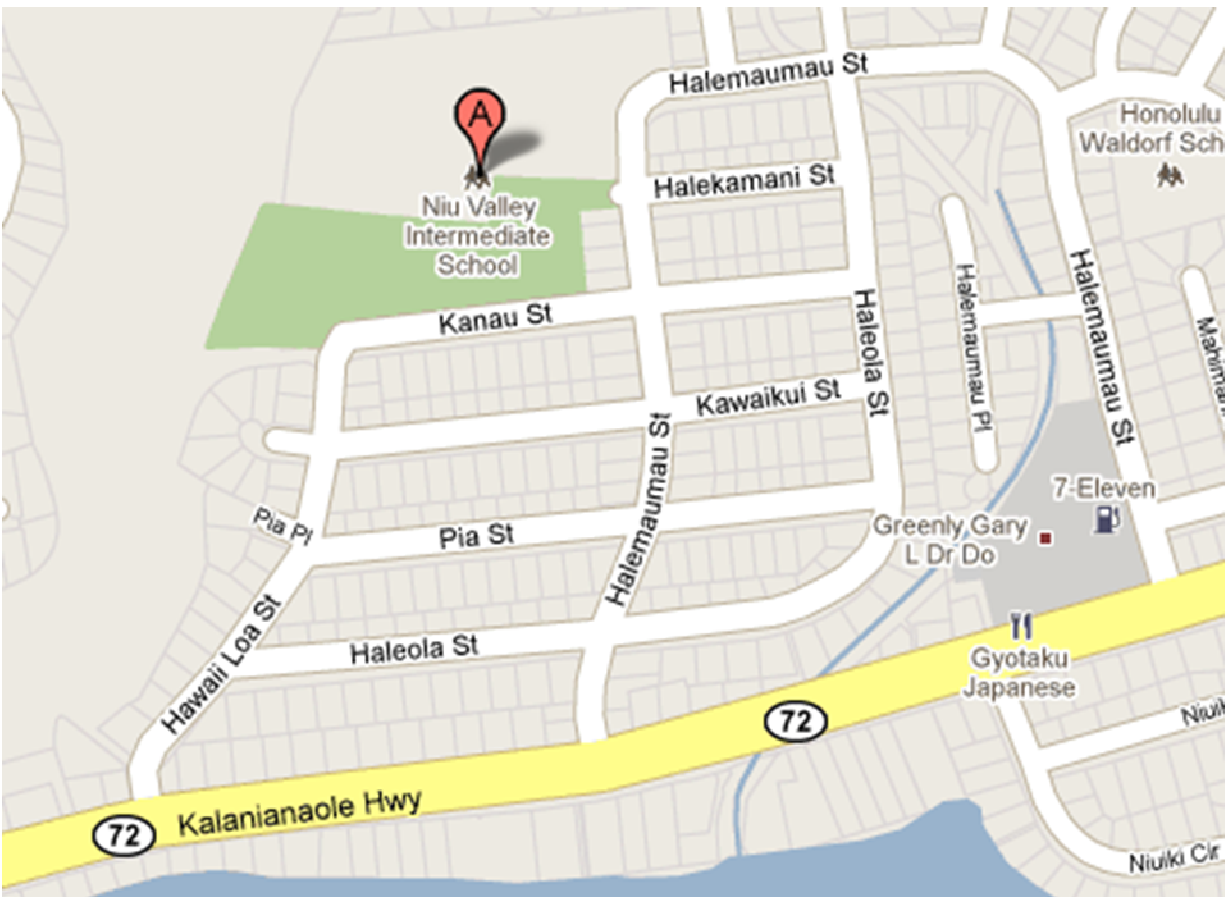

310 Halemaumau Street

Coming East on H1:

1. Continue on Kalaniana'ole Hwy (72) to the signal light at Halemaumau St.
2. This is four signal lights after the Aina Haina Shopping Center (McDonald's on the left)
3. Move to the far LEFT of the three lanes.
4. You will pass Kawaikui Park on your left and the BEFORE Halemaumau is Puuikena Drive.
5. Get into the left turn lane at Halemaumau and wait for the green arrow.
6. You will pass through five intersections before you see the school on the LEFT.
7. Park in any space available.
8. The cafeteria is the large building with the screen doors in front of you.

Coming West on Kalaniana'ole Hwy:

1. Stay in the right lane on Kalaniana'ole Hwy (72) past the Niu Valley Shopping Center.
2. A 7-Eleven is visible in the center.
3. Although this intersection is Halemaumau, it is EAST Halemaumau and not the one you want.
4. Continue through two sets of signal lights past Kentucky Fried Chicken on the right.
5. The next intersection is Halemaumau.
6. Turn RIGHT on Halemaumau.
7. Follow numbers 6 through 8 above.
